Language Classes



Immerse yourself in Italian culture by learning how to dance the tarantella, celebrating Carnevale, and more!






WATCH OUT! FRIDAY THE SEVENTEENTH IS COMING!

Beware and prepare! This month, the 17th falls on a Friday. Wait a minute, what's with Friday, the 17th? Don't you mean Friday, the 13th?

Yes, it's true that in much of the Western world, including the United States, the other Anglo-Saxon countries, and much of Europe, Friday the 13th is considered an unlucky day. However, in Spain and Greece, Tuesday, the 13th is the unlucky day (supposedly the date of the fall of Constantinople in 1453), and in Italy the date to be feared is Friday, the 17th. Both dates occur on a Friday, which is not a coincidence, for that is the day of the crucifixion and death of Jesus Christ, or Good Friday (Venerdi Santo) as we know it. The number 13 can logically be associated with the Last Supper of Jesus at which 13 individuals were present (Christ plus the 12 apostles). Of course, one of those apostles, Judas Iscariot, would betray Christ, so this number could be viewed as being a bringer of disaster and bad luck.

So, why would the number 17 be considered a bringer of misfortune in Italy? There are several theories, and the most plausible seems to have its origins in ancient Rome rather than in Christianity. In ancient Rome, tombstones often bore the inscription "VIXI," which means the deceased "had lived" or in other words, "their life was over." All those letters also happen to be Roman numerals. If we arrange them in the correct order, "X" or ten comes first, then "V" or 5, and finally "II" or two. That results in the Roman Numeral for 17.



Also, the curse associated with 17 may have been reinforced by the destruction of the 17th Roman legion (as well as the 18th and 19th) in the Battle of Teutoburg Forest in Germany in 9 A.D. The numbers 17 and 19 were never used again as legion numbers, although there was again an 18th legion which was later disbanded. And yet another explanation is that the one in the number 17 resembles a condemned man and the seven a gallows, or another representation of death.

While there are those who laugh this off as superstitious nonsense, there are those who avoid traveling, making important decisions, getting married or even going out on Friday the 17th.

Alitalia, the Italian airline, reportedly does not have a row 17 on their aircraft, as well as no row 13 (so you're covered either way). Renault sold its "R17" model in Italy as "R177." Finally, at the Cesana Pariol the bobsleigh, luge, and skeleton track in Cesana, Italy, turn 17 is named "Senza Nome."

May your Friday the 17th be uneventful!
